#### Small Classes & Individual Attention

- Interact in writing courses that are typically limited to 15-20 students and linguistics and literature courses that average fewer than 25 students.
- Study with published authors and teaching award recipients.

# **Department Literary Journals**

- The Chariton Review: This international literary journal
  was founded in 1975, edited by poet Jim Barnes from
  1976 to 2010, and is now edited by creative writing faculty
  member James D'Agostino.
- Green Hills Literary Lantern: Truman's online literary journal publishes the best available poetry, short fiction and creative nonfiction from submissions read year around. A new issue comes out each summer.
- Windfall: Truman State University's student-edited literary and arts magazine provides students with extensive writing, editing, and publishing experiences.
